

Answers to the League of Women Voters Scavenger Hunt

1. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wrote "Tales of a Wayside Inn."
2. The Grist Mill's flour is used in breads served at the Wayside Inn.
3. The famous nursery rhyme associated with the Redstone School is "Mary had a Little Lamb".
4. All of the wood used to build the Martha Mary Chapel came from pines which fell on the property in the hurricane of 1938.
5. The Wadsworth Monument is Sudbury's Town Seal and can be found on all of our street signs.
6. One hundred sixty-eight soldiers served in the Civil War from Sudbury, and eleven died.
7. The kayak used in the Peary Exhibition and now on display at Goodnow Library is made from sealskin.
8. The area of the East-West and the North-South railroad tracks is under consideration for a future rail trail.
9. The Hosmer House ballroom was used for town dances. There was also a candy shop and a cobbler's shop.
10. Town records show that between 400 to 500 soldiers served in the Revolutionary War, some in the field and some on the battle grounds.
11. In Colonial days some grave stones were laid on the ground to prevent wolves from digging up the bodies.
12. The Town Pound would have held stray farm animals, such as cows, sheep, maybe a runaway horse or pig.
13. There is an indentation on the right side of the grinding stone that may have been a seat for the grinders of corn.
14. You can find the front door and key to Haynes Garrison at the Sudbury Historical Museum.
